








Background

- High prevalence of sexual abuse in residential and foster care
- Professionals working in residential and foster care perceive very few cases of sexual abuse
- Professionals are incapable of discussing and supporting healthy sexual development of children and young people
- Competences on how to support a healthy sexual development in children and young people should be gained during (social work) education










Project goal

To develop education and training for (future) professionals to help them to build competences on guiding young people's healthy sexual development and to interact with children and young people, their (foster) parents, colleagues and other professionals on the topic of sexual behaviour, intimacy and inter-personal relations in order to prevent for sexual abuse of children and young people in care









Research question

Which competences (knowledge, skills, attitude) do (future) professionals working in residential and foster care need in order to guide young people's healthy sexual development?











Method

Literature study

Review study of publicly available materials developed for professionals working in residential and foster care (e.g. guidelines/policy documents, interventions, tools, etc.)

Semi-structured interviews

- 5 experts
- 8 policy makers (national and institutional level)
- 35 professionals working in residential (N=23) and foster care (N=12) (focusgroups)












Results - literature study

Type of materials	Included	Analysed
Guidelines and policy documents	50	14
Interventions	36	7
Training programs for professionals	15	1
Educational programs	2	1
Tools and instruments	187	5
Websites	53	3

















Results – interviews + materials Knowledge on:

Your own development, own values and norms on sexuality & intimacy and 'value free' criteria to be used to talk about it

The questions, issues and prejudices young people have, what they need to make responsible decisions and the vocabulary to speak with distinct subgroups

Healthy sexual development (all age groups), groups at risk for unhealthy development, roles & tasks of professionals in stimulating a healthy sexual development and identifying abuse, the instruments & interventions available









Plus: in residential & foster care

Residential care

Importance of a *positive living group* climate and the importance of cognitive behavioural techniques in this respect Risks involved for each *individual* child

Foster care

(Methods & tools for) psychoeducation on the topic to foster parents

Special needs of vulnerable and neglected children and young people or with autism spectrum disorder

Existence and forms of sexual abuse & unsafety plus the risk factors involved










Results – interviews + materials Skills

General skills	Residential care	Foster care
 Conduct conversations on sensitive topics Self reflection Give and receive feedback 	Speak with children and young people about: - Healthy and unhealthy sexual behaviour (e.g. apply Flag system) - Norms and values (in non-judgemental way) - Feelings, interpersonal distance, personal boundaries - Practical things Speak with colleagues about: - Norms and values - Difficulties and insecurities Create safe environment, timing of conversation, use appropriate terms (e.g. intimacy vs. sexuality), cope with diversity, be a role model, stimulate and confirm adequate behaviour / discourage unacceptable behaviour	
	 Create possibilities to experiment with (sexuality related) behaviour Influence interactions and group dynamics 	 Speak with foster parents about their role in sexual development of foster child Coach and teach foster parents









Results – interviews + materials Attitude

- Open and curious attitude
- No prejudice
- Self-reflection
- Courage to talk about sexuality










Conclusions

- (Future) professionals need to have general knowledge, practice based knowledge and self knowledge to guide healthy sexual development of young people in residential and foster care
- (Future) professionals need to have general skills (e.g. conversationals skills) and specific skills to speak about sexuality with young people, other professionals and (foster) parents, create a safe environment and room for experimentation
- (Future) professionals need to have an open, curious and nonjudgemental attitude, the willingness to reflect on ones own behaviour and the courage to talk about sexuality
