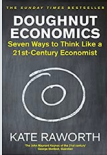


# CET's Summer Reading List

## Our top picks for the holidays



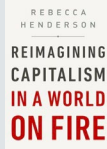
**Doughnut Economics**, by Kate Raworth (2018)
